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From the Principal

I hope that you are well in the face of the current crisis. It would appear that online learning is going to remain a feature of the Victorian landscape until at least the end of Term 3 with, we think some prospects of it continuing after that for sections of the school.

I would again like to thank parents, students and staff for their efforts over the past few months. Initially there was a need for all of us to adopt quickly to the "new norm". We are now in a period, which some have started to describe as the "marathon phase". It is just plain hard and to be frank monotonous, with many of the things that provide joy in our lives not available to us at present. We think it important that we remain focused on an end point, which may not be life as we know it last year, but something close to it. That is not really that far away.

Our feedback so far, is that the majority of students are working well at home; however, there has been a decline in both motivation and attentiveness during this second lockdown. I know a number of parents are concerned that the rate of learning has not been as great as it would have been physically at school. The simple answer to that is they are correct. Online learning is not as effective as physical classes. It is, however, much better than no instruction and I have every confidence that we will be able to get students back on track over the next few months.

There is also a general fatigue that is setting in, this is certainly not something specific to the school. As well as the general issues we think students are, on the whole, missing the social contact and the variety that a day at school brings. Tiredness and inattention are the two big enemies of effective teaching and we are considering ways (particularly for younger students) in which we can break the week up to bring better outcomes for students. These will be discussed and rolled out in the coming weeks. Please remember, however, you are the expert on your child. If you feel they need a break from the screen – give them one. It is not going to have any lasting impact on their education.

On the longer-term economic front, the impact of the second lockdown has certainly caused an array of difficulties for families. The School is cognisant of this and is looking to do what it can to help. I remind families that the School has established a substantial hardship fund for those families who are experiencing financial difficulties. The School Board has also agreed to the following variation on Fees and Charges for Term 3:

- i) A full credit for bus charges for students in Prep to Year 8.
- ii) A credit of seven weeks of the bus charges for students in Years 9 to 12.
- iii) A 10% reduction on Tuition Fees for all students in Prep to Year 12 for Term 3.
- iv) A 10% reduction in the Building Levy for all students in Prep to Year 12 for Term 3.

Bacchus Marsh Grammar seeks when setting fees to have a small surplus, which it applies to capital expenditure, primarily for the development of infrastructure. We feel that for this term that small surplus (and some more) is best directed back to parents. I do, however, wish to stress that arrangements like this are not sustainable in the long-term. The School is very mindful of the economic impacts of the current crisis. Adjustments will be applied to debtor's accounts at the earliest opportunity. I understand that the longer the crisis continues the deeper the impact particularly on wellbeing. We are endeavouring to do everything we can to ensure that the next few weeks go smoothly, and that recovery is swift and successful.

This term, the students have begun new units in both Literacy and Numeracy. They are enjoying Integrated Studies in which they have been focussing on 'Past and Present', looking at how technology has changed over time and the impact this has had on people's lives. Students also look forward to their weekly specialist classes and enjoy sharing what they have been doing in Art, Music, Science and Physical Education.

A major focus in Year Two has been the pastoral care program which focusses on the social and emotional wellbeing of the students. One part of this program has been the introduction of Wonderful Wednesday, Fun Friday or Freaky Friday when one afternoon per week, students select open-ended, project type tasks from a choice board. Practical engagement through remote learning - Food & Hospitality


