During these unprecedented times, staying healthy and keeping things as normal as possible are perhaps some of the most critical and challenging things to do. As part of keeping things normal, I wanted to continue to do something that I enjoy – Public Speaking.

In late July 2020, I was fortunate to participate and win the Victorian Western Region Speaking Competition run by "Rostrum Australia". I will now be representing the Western region in the State finals to be conducted later in the year.

For the first time, the competition was conducted online via Zoom. All participants had to present a 6-minute prepared speech and be adjudicated live. Participants had to choose from a variety of interesting topics, such as "Not off the top of my head", "Or else", "Artificial Intelligence" (AI), "Seeds of Greatness", "Out of the blue" and "A Wing and a Prayer". My topic of interest was Artificial Intelligence, and I enlightened the audience about the pros and cons with real-world examples. Currently, staff members are completing Interim Reports for all students in Prep to Year 4. These will be posted out in the near future. An Interim report is designed to provide parents/guardians with a snapshot of how their child has been approaching their studies throughout the term. This provides parents/guardians with an opportunity to discuss with the child their approach to learning and support them to make improvements, if required, prior to the end of term.

Wellbeing

During the normal school day, often both classroom teachers and students recognise when they need a short break from the task at hand for a toilet break or to be sent to run a special errand that gives them a quick break and a chance to stretch their legs. You might also find this is the case whilst learning at home. Please feel free to give your child a break during scheduled learning sessions.

If this means that you feel it is more beneficial for your own well-being to enjoy a tea break in the garden or go for a walk after lunch, rather than engage in the afternoon learning session, this will certainly also be of benefit to your child. Again, please make sure you communicate this with your child's classroom teacher.

Looking after yourself as well as your child will assist in being able to sustain positive engagement with the remote learning program as the term progresses.
