

Spotlight on Teaching and Learning in the Junior School (Maddingley)

The role of phonological and phonemic awareness in successful reading.

Previous newsletter items have highlighted the importance of beginning readers learning the alphabetic code, the phonemes (sounds) and graphemes (letters) that represent the phonemes, to successfully access text. If a child is struggling to learn the alphabetic code or is having difficulties applying this knowledge to single word or text reading, this could be the result of poor phonological awareness.

'Most children who will struggle with learning to read have underdeveloped phonemic awareness when they enter school'. Ashby, J. et al. (2022)



As illustrated on Scarborough's reading rope, phonological awareness is one of the essential skills required for successful word recognition. It is an important prereading skill related to the ability to hear, identify and play with the sounds in spoken language including rhymes, syllables, and the

smallest units of sound (phonemes). Children with strong phonological awareness skills are ready to become readers.

Phonological awareness refers to the ability to hear, recognise and play with the sounds in spoken language. Phonological awareness is a group of skills that include the following: *identifying words that rhyme, counting the number of syllables in a name, recognising alliteration (words with the same beginning sound), segmenting (breaking) a sentence into words and identifying the syllables in a word.*

Phonemic awareness comes under the umbrella of phonological awareness. Phonemic awareness is the most sophisticated phonological awareness skill (and the last to develop) and refers to the ability to hear, recognise and play with the individual phonemes (sounds) in spoken words. Phonemic awareness skills include the following: *blending individual sounds to make a word, segmenting a word into its individual sounds and adding, removing, or substituting beginning, middle or end sounds to make a new word.*

Phonemic awareness is the most powerful predictor of future reading ability in young children. Children who struggle with reading, including those with a diagnosed learning difficulty such as dyslexia, often have trouble with phonemic awareness, but with targeted phonemic awareness instruction they can be successful.

Parents can support their children in developing strong phonological and phonemic awareness by practising these aural/oral skills regularly at home. Ideas for developing phonological and phonemic awareness will feature in the Junior School News section of the newsletter each week. This week's bright idea focuses on the phonological awareness skill of rhyming. Look out for more 'bright ideas' in the coming weeks.

Phonological and Phonemic Awareness Bright Idea – Rhyming

Rhyme Time

I am thinking of an animal that rhymes with big. What's the animal?" Answer: pig. What else rhymes with big? (dig, fig, wig).



Road trip rhymes

While you're out driving in the car, spot something out the window and ask your child, 'What rhymes with tree (or car or shop)?' Then switch roles and have your child spot something and ask you for a rhyme. This may turn into a game of nonsense rhymes which is still great for practicing sounds!

Spotlight on Maddingley Year 2

Welcome back to Term Three! The students have made a very positive and enthusiastic start and we are excited about the great term of learning ahead. This term, students will travel around Australia and learn about the Australian states and territories, significant landmarks, local flora and fauna and they will explore the connection between Indigenous peoples and the land.

Students will engage in a variety of reading and writing activities as they focus on reading nonfiction texts and using learnt information to help them create their own information reports. The focus on 'reading to learn' will continue and students will investigate animal habitats across the seven continents and will build their knowledge of insects through a unit of study on minibeasts. Students are continuing to enjoy small group reading and the STAR reading program. It has been fantastic to see so many students bringing in reading materials from home.

Students are continuing to enhance their mathematical thinking and knowledge of addition and subtraction with a variety of hands-on activities. They will continue to use concrete materials to explore and demonstrate their understanding of the connection between addition and subtraction. Students will begin a unit of study on time, focusing on understanding the passing and sequence of time, learning to read and use calendars, and telling the time on analogue and digital clocks.

Science and Technology Day at Staughton Vale - Woodlea Year 7

In the first week of Term 3, the Year 7 Woodlea students attended Staughton Vale where they were able to participate in a range of Design Technology and Science experiences.

In Design Technology, the students are currently learning about the Design Process. They were able to apply these skills to design a habitat or a nesting box to support the animals that live in the Staughton Vale environment. The excursion provided an opportunity for students to immerse themselves in the home of the animals and allowed for a genuine understanding of the requirements of the animals that live there.



Students hiked to the back of the property where they were able to explore the bushland to investigate what natural logs and hollows exist for animals to live in. Students were also on the lookout to see what natural food sources were available for the animals.

Students were surprised to see that while there are a significant number of trees, they were all too young to have developed natural hollows for animals to live in. This highlighted the significance that the project in class can benefit the animals that make Staughton Vale their home. It also helped students to appreciate the importance of not cutting down established trees as they are needed by so many animals.

In Science, throughout Term 3, the Year 7 students are learning about Forces and Simple Machines. The students rotated through a series of activities demonstrating applications of Simple Machines in our everyday lives and how these machines change force.





The students started in the Staughton Vale Kitchen where they classified everyday kitchen utensils into the simple machines that make them so useful: these included wheel and axles, wedges and introduction of gears. The students also participated in groups to complete a Pulley Challenge in which they needed to plan

and design a pulley system to be able to raise and lower bird seed to feed the native birds. Finally, the students explored the different classes of levers and were given a challenge to manoeuvre a tennis ball into a ring, only using the three classes of levers they had just explored. Some students demonstrated how to use branches to lift rocks, highlighting the usefulness of simple machines in an outdoor setting.

It was pleasing to hear students comment on how they enjoyed the day at the Staughton Vale campus and how these activities helped them to have a deeper understanding of their learning in Design Technology and Science. As students return to the classroom, they will complete their design project and continue their study of Forces, showcasing that this experience has been an impetus to the ongoing learning this term.

Academic Spotlight - Year 9/10 Exercise Physiology

Picture an exhausted athlete; dripping in sweat, vigorously inhaling and exhaling, with their heart beating a million miles per hour and their legs feeling like jelly.

We all know that these are the responses of the human body when it engages in exercise, but what happens inside the body for these responses to occur? Well, that is what we explore in Exercise Physiology. We take a deep dive inside the human body to investigate the importance of oxygen, how our bodies convert our food intake into useable energy, what causes our bodies to fatigue and the most effective ways to recover and replenish the body and its systems in a bid to return our bodies to a pre-exercise state sooner.

This upcoming semester aims to provide 'practical experiences for purpose' to assist students in their learning. Whether completing a Yo-Yo Endurance Test, Phosphate Recovery Test or playing a range of different sports, it will give students some context for the onset of fatigue and the monitoring of the contribution of the energy system. Students will experience a real-world context in which to match the new language we have been using and studying in class.

Ultimately, it is hoped that students can be left with valuable knowledge about the in depth functioning of their body systems which can help improve their own performance within their own sports and exercise endeavours.

ICCES Debating & Chess – Tuesday 26 July


