Achieving Optimal Academic Performance - Why Camps are so important to Academic Success.

During Term Four, many year level camps will have the opportunity to proceed again after the last two years of COVID "shutdowns" and cancellations. Many parents often question the necessity of school camps. Why do my children need to attend? Is there any benefit in camping under canvas? The high ropes course is too dangerous! The purpose of school camps, as well as being fun and giving students the opportunity to socialise in an educational setting, is to push students beyond their comfort zones. The activities are unfamiliar and challenging, being away from family may be unfamiliar and, at times, uncomfortable and working in teams may be unfamiliar. Life sends us many unfamiliar situations and challenges for which we must be prepared to be brave and have a go. The skills learnt on camp and in the outdoors are directly transferable to the classroom and the academic setting and are vital in preparing our children for the challenges that life will "throw at them." Life is full of uncertainty and we need to ensure we aid the journey of development and give our young people opportunities to be brave, to have a go and accept the situation when it does not turn out as they had hoped.

As young people embark on unfamiliar activities, like those attempted on school camps, teachers and parents should first show what needs to be done, if necessary, assist the student to do it and then let the child work independently. Each step is critical to allowing the student the chance to trust in their own ability and believe in themselves. This is very much part of the Teaching and Learning Framework applied in the academic classroom, "I do, We do, You do." I wish all staff and students a wonderful time in Term Four as they once again head out on Year Level Camps and encourage parents to think about some of the great benefits of school camps which clearly involves improving academic abilities.

Five great benefits of school camps:

- 1. Camps develop **confidence**. Students grow their confidence in managing for themselves. Camps promote independence and opportunities for students to fulfil responsibilities.
- Camps develop problem-solving abilities such as putting up a tent or cooking on a trangia.
- 3. Students are **immersed in the natural environment** and experience the wonder of the Australian environment
- 4. Camps develop **social interactions** such as patience, sharing, helping and including others. Team building is evident in every activity completed. Students encourage each other, celebrate their successes together and embraced each other's different skillsets.
- 5. Camps develop **bravery!** Providing this adventure enables our students to build the confidence to try new and different experiences more structured in the younger years and more independent in the older years.

Phones/AirPods/Ear Buds/Headphones

As of the commencement of Term 4 all phones/ear buds/headphones etc must not be used on school grounds. 

Spotlight on Teaching and Learning in the Junior School

Learning to Read: Phonics Instruction

Phonics instruction teaches the relationships between the letters of written language and the sounds of spoken language. Children's reading development is dependent on their understanding of the alphabetic principle — the idea that letters and letter patterns represent the sounds of spoken language. As shown on Scarborough's reading rope, knowledge of the alphabetic principle and the ability to connect phonemes (sounds) with their corresponding graphemes (letters) are essential for successful word recognition.



The goal of phonics instruction is to help children learn the alphabetic principle — the idea that letters represent the sounds of spoken language and that there is an organised, logical, and predictable relationship between written letters and spoken sounds.

Learning that there are predictable relationships between sounds and letters allows children to apply these relationships to both familiar and unfamiliar words and begin to read with fluency.

Children are taught, for example, that the letter <u>m</u> represents the sound **/m/**, and that it is the first letter in words such as <u>m</u>at, <u>m</u>outh and <u>m</u>agic. When children understand phoneme-grapheme correspondence, they are able to sound out and read (decode) new words.

Bacchus Marsh Grammar delivers phonics instruction that is both <u>systematic</u>: the letter-sound relationship is taught in an organized and logical sequence and <u>explicit</u>: the instruction provides teachers with precise directions for teaching letter-sound relationships. Phonics instruction is most effective when it begins at Kindergarten or Prep.

Systematic phonics instruction begins with the <u>simple code</u> where one letter represents one sound. This includes the consonants: m s f p t c b h n d g l v y r z j k w (plus qu – two letters, two sounds and x – one letter, two sounds) and the short vowels: a i o e u.

When students have mastered the simple code, they are introduced to the <u>extended code</u> where two letters work together to represent one sound. This includes double letters such as, II ss ff and consonant digraphs: ck sh ch th ng wh ph (plus tch).

The next phase in phonics instruction includes the introduction of the <u>complex code</u>. The complex code includes alternative spellings for long vowels: /a/, /e/, /i/, /o/, /ou/, /oi/, /oo/, /oo/ and /yoo/; alternative spellings for r-controlled vowels: /ar/, /or/, /er/, /air/; alternative spellings for consonants /r/, /m/, /n/; and the alternative pronunciation of g and c('soft g' /j/ and 'soft c' /s/) after e, y or i.

Children who can recognise the letters of the alphabet in print and know at least the most common sounds associated with each letter, as per the simple code, will have an advantage when they begin school.

Parents can support their child's development in understanding the alphabetic principle by providing opportunities to learn that written words are made up of letters that match the sounds in spoken words.

Here are some activities to try at home:

- Say letter-sounds and have your child write the letter or letters that match the sounds.
- Play word games that connect sounds with syllables and words (for example, if the letters "p-e-n" spell pen, how do you spell hen?).
- Write letters on cards. Hold up the cards one at a time and have your child say the sounds (for example, the /d/ sound for the letter d).

- Teach your child to match the letters in their names with the sounds in their names.
- Point out words that begin with the same letter as your child's name (for example, <u>R</u>ayansh and <u>r</u>un). Talk about how the beginning sounds of the words are alike.
- Use alphabet books and guessing games to give your child practice in matching letters and sounds. A good example is the game, 'I am thinking of something that starts with the sound /t/.'
- Write letters on pieces of paper and put them in a paper bag. Let your child reach into the bag and take out letters. Have them say the sounds that match the letters.
- Take a letter and hide it in your hand. Let your child guess in which hand the letter is. Then show the letter and have your child say the letter name and make the sound (for example, the letter <u>m</u> matches the **/m/** sound as in <u>m</u>an).
- Make letter-sounds and ask your child to draw the matching letters in shaving foam, flour, sprinkles or sand.
- Take egg cartons and put a paper letter in each slot until you have all the letters of the alphabet in order. Say lettersounds and ask your child to pick out the letters that match those sounds.

Children benefit from having frequent opportunities to apply what they are learning about phonemes (sounds) and their corresponding graphemes (letters), which in turn should improve their word recognition, spelling and reading comprehension.




