Food for the Future

Students making an impact on reducing food waste in the home while supporting locals in need.

The students in the Year 9 & 10 Food for the Future class are making an impact in their local community. This subject aims to educate students on the many issues related to the food industry and our impact as food consumers. Over the last few weeks, we have been looking at the impact of food and packaging waste on the environment. Did you know that, on average, Australians throw away 20% of the food they purchase every week?

In response to looking at ways to reduce the amount of food packaging, and especially cling wrap used in the home, the students learnt about alternative materials that can keep food fresh. They then made their own beeswax food wraps that they gifted to their families or kept for wrapping up their own lunches.

Then, as a way of reducing the amount of food waste from the BMG Food Department, the students have been using the excess ingredients from other classes to make nutritious meals for the local community support group, Soul Food. Soul Food offers a free weekly lunch to those in the community who may not have regular access to nutritious meals and it is also a means of offering social connection to those in the community who may feel isolated.

However, with the increasing cost of living and financial pressures, Soul Food has seen an increased level of food insecurity within our local community and has responded by providing take-home meals to several local families. As a response to this need, the Food for the Future class was proud to prepare and provide 50 nutritious meals this week as part of our ongoing support of Soul Food. To hear the stories of how our contribution is helping the local community put a smile on the faces of all involved.


