Building Character requires having to say NO!

As a parent when was the last time you said "No" to your child?

- A Sorry no! You can't go to that party.
- No, you can't have Snapchat because you are not old enough.
- No, you can't have a new mobile phone because we can't afford it.

When we think about some of our biggest challenges there is no doubt that the simple task of saying "No" to our children is one that many of us struggle with. 'No' is one of the smallest words in the English language, but it carries a lot of power. With saying no comes the ability to do what matters, it allows us to be true to our values and virtues and keeps us and those around us safe.

As parents of teenagers, saying no is certainly something that many of us grapple with. We all dearly love our children and of course we always want what is best for them. However, if the choice exists between denying a teenager what they want and dealing with a meltdown, emotional blackmail and the "end of the world" or saying yes, we often take the easier path. Even if we actually know that saying no would have been the best for our child. When was the last time you said yes when you should have said no?

We want to be liked by our teenagers, but we also need to remember we are parents and our role is to keep them safe and try and guide them on the correct path. Our children will still love us even if we say no. It may just take them a little bit of time and a growing maturity to understand that we actually have their best interests at heart.

No is a very valuable word when combined with learning about life. When you take the time to explain your thoughts and insight into your feelings or reasoning, you equip your teenager with the rationale for making good decisions. They may not want to listen at the time, but they will understand eventually.

Saying no to your teenager is very important to help deepen and reinforce your family values, our school and community values and our boundaries, and expectations. It builds character in our children and teaches resilience. Parents need to set limits to keep their children as safe as possible. How they react to these limits varies enormously. Remember that you only have boundaries and expectations because you love them. Make this clear to your child.

Tips on how to say NO! to your teenager.

- 1. Trust your intuition. Your job is to protect your child and keep them safe. Make your decision and stick with it.
- 2. Be considered. Give yourself a moment to pause and assess the situation before responding. Seek further information and advice if needed.
- 4. Be honest. Giving the why of no can be important for adolescents; share how you feel.
- 5. Suggest an alternative option that reduces the risk to something that that may be acceptable. Embrace opportunities that allow your child to extend themselves a little, but which don't compromise safety or your values and beliefs.

- 6. While challenging, be open to changing your no to a yes. Take time to listen carefully to requests. As your teenager matures and learns to make good decisions, they need to be able to negotiate and work with you for a compromise.
- 7. Sometimes your teenager may want you to say no because this could be an easier option and someone else to hold responsible for the decision.

Being a parent is not easy and because we love our children so much, we obviously want the very best for them. However, giving into their every need and request is not protecting them, it is not caring for them and in the long term it is not teaching and educating them for the future.

Exams

As part of the 2024 Co-Curricula Program at the Maddingley Campus, the Explorers Club at Bacchus Marsh Grammar is intending to run an Expedition to Tasmania to complete the 3 Capes Track in September.

The BMG Explorers Club will motivate students to contemplate exploration and adventure. It will look at explorers of the past and present and investigate what made their adventures so special, how they were able to complete them, and why they are so important for our society today. The Explorers Club will teach and live its motto:

"Character through Adventure"

The club will also provide students with the opportunity to go on adventures and explore their own possibilities, with the 3 Capes Track Expedition being our first major adventure.

The cost will be approximately \$2,000 per student, (dependent on student numbers) and this is inclusive of accommodation, some meals, transport whilst in Tasmania, incidental charges, Track Fees, day/night activities (Mawson's Hut Museum, Mt Wellington Bus Tour) as well flights to and from Melbourne. Students will be required to provide their own food which will be carried by them whilst on the track. Accommodation on the track will be in modern Eco Huts.

The school will provide all students with Back Packs for the hike, Rain Jackets and Pants.

The proposed dates of the Camp will be: Departing on Thursday September 12 – Returning to Melbourne on Tuesday September 17 2024.

Bus and Transport Updates

Eating on the Bus

A reminder to students that there is no eating allowed on private buses. Unfortunately, some students are leaving rubbish and food on their seats.

Students who leave their rubbish or food on the bus, are breaching the Code of Conduct of bus travel and will receive consequences as noted in the Student Bus Travel Code of Conduct.

Parking

A reminder to parents it is recommended that parents pull off the road into a service road or designated car park (where possible) while picking up or dropping off their children at the bus stop.

We request that parents are mindful not to park their cars in the way of the bus and ensure that the bus has enough space to safely drive into and pull out of the stopping zone. Also, as our buses stop in a residential area, it is important that parents DO NOT park in or across a driveway, and always respect residential property.

Parents are reminded to be mindful of the turning area of the bus in residential streets. This may mean parents need to park their car a short distance from the stop and walk to the stop to drop off or collect their child as a courtesy to the driver and others.

Student Permission Cards

Students in Prep – Year 6 require a green permission tag on their bag if they are to disembark the bus to be picked up by someone other than their parent/guardian. Students in Grade 5 & 6 can disembark the bus on their own if they have a green permission tag on their bag for the driver to check. Student Afternoon Bus Arrangement & Permission Notices are available on Schoolbox under School Letters. Please return Student Afternoon Bus Arrangement & Permission Notices to bus@bmg.vic.edu.au. Calls on the day to advise us that someone else will be collecting your child will not be accepted.

Student ID Cards

Students MUST use their Student ID card to tap on/off their private bus. Student ID cards are compulsory when boarding a private bus or attending all school excursions/camps etc and they must be carried at all times.

Students who board the bus repeatedly without their ID cards will receive a detention or further consequences. If a student has lost or misplaced their Student ID card they are to go to ICT to have a new card printed.

Bacchus Marsh Grammar has a private Shuttle Service available for students and staff to utilise between Rockbank Station and the Woodlea Campus. 


